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Dear Parents and Carers,

Re: Spelling Curriculum Review

After a review of our spelling curriculum, we have chosen to use the *No Nonsense Spelling Programme* to teach spelling. We made this decision because it has clear progression through blocks of teaching units each year and matches the ambition of the National Curriculum. The focus of the programme is on the teaching of spelling. The expectation is that spelling knowledge of spelling conventions - patterns and rules and the opportunity to promote the learning of spellings, including statutory words, common exceptions and personal spellings- will be taught explicitly.

Testing Content Taught

We know that there is little evidence that the traditional practice of learning spellings at home and being tested on them is effective. However, there is a high expectation within the National Curriculum that pupils will learn many increasingly complex words. We have therefore modified the way in which children's knowledge of the spelling is tested in school. Children will now be sent home each week with a spelling pattern and rule that they must practise using. They will be tested on five words which follow the spelling pattern. We will also send home five words from the statutory word list for each year group for the children to learn. **Adaptions may be made and some words might be from a different year group, depending on any gaps in spelling knowledge that might be identified through teacher assessment or for our children with specific needs.** We hope that this way of testing a spelling pattern will enable children to learn and apply a spelling pattern to many words rather than knowing how to spell just a few, having a positive and long term impact on their writing attainment.

Within the programme, a range of strategies for learning spellings are introduced and practised. This enables pupils to choose the strategies they find most effective for learning different words. I have attached these for your information along with the spelling expectations of your child's year group.

Year Two National Curriculum Requirements:

Pupils should be taught to spell by

- segmenting spoken words into phonemes and representing these by graphemes, spelling many correctly
- learning new ways of spelling phonemes for which one or more spellings are already known, and learning some words with each spelling, including a few common homophones
- learning to spell common exception words
- learning to spell more words with contracted forms
- learning the possessive apostrophe (singular), for example, the girl's book
- distinguishing between homophones and near homophones
- adding suffixes to spell longer words, for example, '-ment', '-ful', '-less', '-ly'
- applying spelling rules and guidelines, as listed in English Appendix 1
- writing from memory simple sentences dictated by the teacher that include words using the GPCs, common exception words and punctuation taught so far.
